









Pedestrian and Bicyclist Trauma Data










Miami-Dade Crash Reports

Signal 4 Analytics - 2012-2022






Matilda Street: Kids painted a pop-up bike lane for Bike to School Day









SMART Commuter Rail Project

This item was waived onto the TPO Board agenda due to lack of quorum for the September 28, 2023, Transportation and Mobility meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

On September 18, 2023, the Transportation Planning Council (TPC) recommended approval of an amendment to the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) to modify funding for planning consistency and to move to Priority I of the Plan the Northeast Corridor Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Commuter Rail Project.

BACKGROUND

In 2016, the Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Governing Board officially adopted and endorsed the Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Plan. The SMART Plan is a comprehensive plan which advances six rapid transit corridors and a network of Bus Express Rapid Transit service to implement mass transit projects in Miami-Dade County. In June 2022, the SMART Plan transitioned into the SMART Program implementation phase.

The Northeast Corridor is a regional connection that links Miami-Dade County with neighbors to the north via the Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway. This project will construct five new stations and include rail modifications, which allow for a more localized commuter rail service to supplement the existing Brightline service along the corridor. DTPW has been working with the TPO, South Florida Regional Transportation Authority, and the Florida Department of Transportation to conduct the necessary planning efforts related to this service. These include working with local communities to ensure station locations are integrated with surrounding land use and development.

Attached is correspondence from DTPW providing additional information.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

The new total project cost is \$588,663,000. The Project Development and Environmental (PD&E) study is underway and DTPW is now seeking funding from the Federal Transit Administration to secure funding of future phases. To be eligible for the federal funds, DTPW must ensure planning consistency throughout its financial plans and federal planning documents.

- WHEREAS, the Interlocal Agreement creating and establishing the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Miami Urbanized Area requires that the Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO), in its role as the MPO, provides a structure to evaluate the adequacy of the transportation planning and programming process; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Transportation Planning Council (TPC) has been established as the technical advisory council to the TPO Governing Board; and
- **WHEREAS**, in 2016, the TPO Governing Board adopted Resolution #06-16, which established transit as the "highest priority" in Miami-Dade County; and
- WHEREAS, subsequently, the Governing Board unanimously adopted Resolution #26-16, which approved the Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Plan to implement mass transit projects throughout the County; and
- **WHEREAS**, the SMART Plan includes six (6) rapid transit corridors along with a network of Bus Express Rapid Transit (BERT) services; and
- WHEREAS, in June 2022, the SMART Plan transitioned into the SMART Program implementation phase; and
 - WHEREAS, the Northeast Corridor is one of the six (6) SMART Program rapid transit corridors; and
- WHEREAS, the Northeast Corridor is a regional connection that links Miami-Dade County with neighbors to the north via the Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway; and
- WHEREAS, the amendment to the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) will modify funding for planning consistency and advance the Northeast Corridor SMART Commuter Rail Project to Priority I of the plan; and
- **WHEREAS**, the TPC has reviewed the amendment to the 2045 LRTP, made a part hereof, and finds it consistent with the goals and objectives of the Transportation Plan for the Miami Urbanized Area,
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION IN ITS ROLE AS THE MPO FOR THE MIAMI URBANIZED AREA, that the attached amendment to the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan to modify funding for planning consistency and advance to Priority I the Northeast Corridor Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Commuter Rail Project, is hereby approved.

On April 21, 2016, the Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) Governing Board officially adopted and endorsed the Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Plan. The SMART plan is a comprehensive plan which advances six rapid transit corridors and a network of Bus Express Rapid Transit service in order to implement mass transit projects in Miami-Dade County. The Northeast Corridor is a regional connection that links Miami-Dade County with neighbors to the north via the Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway.

This project will construct 5 new stations and include rail modifications. This will allow for a more localized commuter rail service to supplement the existing Brightline service along the corridor.

The County has been working with TPO, SFRTA, and the FDOT to conduct the necessary planning efforts related to this service. These include working with local communities to ensure station locations are integrated with surrounding land use and development.

The PD&E study is already underway and DTPW is now seeking funding from FTA in order to secure fund of future phases. To be eligible for the federal funds, DTPW must ensure planning consistency throughout its financial plans and federal planning documents. Because of this, the County is seeking to modify the LRTP to align with the current cost estimates and funding.



This item was placed on the agenda at the request of TPO Chairman Esteban Bovo, Jr., and is scheduled on the September 28, 2023, Executive Policy Committee meeting agenda.

BACKGROUND

This item adopts a process for the appointment of two (2) members to the governing body of the Greater Miami Expressway Agency (GMX) and directs the Executive Director or Executive Director's designee to issue a public advertisement requesting resumes of interested and qualified individuals for potential appointment to the governing body of the GMX. Additionally, the Executive Policy Committee is directed to review the resumes received and bring recommendations to the TPO Governing Board for the meeting currently scheduled for December 7, 2023, or next available meeting thereafter.

On May 11, 2023, the Governor signed into law House Bill (HB) 1305 which, among other provisions, reestablished GMX and recognized that the Miami-Dade Expressway Authority (MDX) was dissolved by chapter 2019-169, Laws of Florida. HB 1305 provides that two of the nine members of the governing body of the GMX shall be appointed by the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for a county served by GMX. The TPO is the only MPO for a county served by GMX.

The two TPO appointees to the GMX must be:

- 1. permanent residents of a county served by GMX;
- 2. residents of an incorporated municipality within a county served by GMX; and
- 3. may not hold, or have held in the previous two years, elected or appointed office in the county of the prospective member's permanent residency.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

There is no fiscal impact to the TPO Program.

STEP was created to facilitate interagency coordination, innovation, and accelerated implementation of pedestrian and bicycle improvements projects that increase connectivity and enhance safety in Miami-Dade County.

According to countywide statistics published by the Florida Traffic Safety Dashboard, in 2022, there were 281 serious injuries and 106 fatalities resulting from bicycle and pedestrian crashes in Miami-Dade County, with 14 serious injuries (or approximately 5%) and 1 fatality (or approximately 1%) involving children under the age of 15.

The U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) advises the most fatal and serious bicyclist crashes occur at non-intersection locations, with nearly onethird of these crashes involving motorists passing other vehicles that can lead to severe injury. The agency further informs that providing dedicated facilities for the use of bicyclists can mitigate or prevent interactions, conflicts, and crashes between bicyclists and motor vehicles, and create a network of safer roadways for bicycling. Moreover, FHWA recommends that state and local agencies consider implementing protected bicycle lanes to make bicycling safer.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the TPO Governing Board support the redesignation of the existing TPO in Miami-Dade County and reaffirm regional transportation planning coordination through the Southeast Florida Transportation Council (SEFTC).

BACKGROUND

Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) were created by Congress for the intention of providing a forum for consideration and decision making for transportation matters at the local level close to those affected by the decisions and providing accountability to the affected parties through the appointment of local elected officials of general purpose local governments. Section 134 of Title 23 of the United States Code requires the designation of MPOs in urban areas, as defined by the Unites States Census Bureau, and sets forth membership requirements for MPOs designated for transportation management areas with a population of 200,000 or more. The Miami-Dade TPO has been designated as the MPO for Miami-Dade County since 1977 following the initial creation of MPOs and redesignated following each decennial census by the Governor. The Miami-Dade TPO has carried out the federal and state requirements for transportation planning as evidenced by satisfactory findings during periodic reviews by federal and state transportation agencies, including the most recent successful federal recertification in 2023.

Miami-Dade County is the most populous and demographically diverse county in Florida with over 2.7 million residents. The Miami-Dade TPO operates within one of the most complex and multi-jurisdictional structures for the planning and implementation of transportation projects in the State of Florida. The Miami Urbanized Area encompasses Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach counties. Due to the complexity and the unique characteristics of each area the Miami-Dade TPO, Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization (BMPO) and Palm Beach Transportation Planning Agency (PBTPA), have consistently affirmed their respective desires to remain as separate MPOs within an urbanized area.

The Miami-Dade TPO has successfully coordinated transportation planning activities with BMPO and PBTPA for those plans and programs with regional implications. In 2005, the three designated MPOs created the SEFTC to facilitate and improve performance of regional transportation planning among the MPOs, transportation agencies, transit operators and regional planning councils in Southeast Florida. SEFTC has prepared a regional transportation improvement program, developed, and approved regional priorities used in the Transportation Regional Incentives Program, identified regional measures of effectiveness, prioritized regional transportation projects, and facilitated coordination of commuter rail studies to provide additional passenger rail services in Southeast Florida. Additionally, SEFTC has completed Regional Transportation Plans (RTP) for the years 2030, 2035, 2040, and 2045 and is currently developing a 2050 RTP under the leadership of the Miami-Dade TPO.

Based on a triparty Memorandum of Understanding, the Miami-Dade TPO is currently leading the administrative and technical staff functions of SEFTC as part of a national best practice to collaborate and rotate responsibilities among the three MPOs in the Miami Urbanized Area, from January 1, 2023, until December 31, 2028. Responsibilities include the development of the 2050 RTP, as well as supporting SERPM 9.0 travel demand model update for the Southeast Florida region. SEFTC has also accomplished regional efforts in the areas of freight, non-motorized planning, modeling, public involvement, as well as other regional initiatives. SEFTC has successfully been recognized and highlighted nationally by the United States Department of Transportation as a national model of regional cooperation.

The Miami-Dade TPO finds it appropriate to perform the transportation planning at the local level in response to concerns and needs of residents and businesses in Miami-Dade County and participate in regional transportation planning activities through SEFTC, including TPO's current leadership role administering SEFTC on behalf of the region.

BACKGROUND

Miami-Dade County is a charter county and is the most populous and demographically diverse county in Florida with over 2.7 million residents. This Governing Board operates within one of the most complex and multi-jurisdictional structures for the planning and implementation of transportation projects in the State of Florida.

Section 339.175(4)(a), Florida Statutes, requires the Governing Board to review the composition of its membership in conjunction with the decennial census, as prepared by the United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, and with the agreement of the Governor and the affected general purpose local government units that constitute the existing TPO. The Census Bureau published that Miami-Dade population grew by 205,332 between April 1, 2010, and April 1, 2020.

In accordance with Section 6(e), Article VIII of the Florida State Constitution, any county chartered may elect to have its county commission serve as the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) if the MPO's jurisdiction is wholly contained within the county. In addition to the entire county commission, pursuant to section 339.175(3)(d), Florida Statues, the Governor must appoint four additional voting members to the TPO, one elected official representing a municipality within the county; one expressway authority member, one nonelected individual residing in the unincorporated portion of the county, and one school board member. Under section 339.176, Florida Statues, the voting membership of any MPO whose geographical boundaries include any county as defined in section 125.011(1), Florida

Statutes, must include an additional voting member appointed by the governing body for each city with a population of 50,000 or more residents.

In coordination with the Florida Department of Transportation and Miami-Dade County, the Governing Board's metropolitan planning area boundary within the Miami Urbanized Area has been established to be coterminous with the Miami-Dade County map.



Safe Routes to School Program **Subject:**

This item was waived onto the TPO Board agenda due to lack of quorum for the September 28, 2023, Transportation and Mobility meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the TPO Governing Board urge the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to reinstate the Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Program as soon as possible with adequate funding levels to support the non-motorized infrastructure needs of Miami-Dade County.

BACKGROUND

The SRTS program promotes walking and bicycling to school through infrastructure improvements, safety education, and incentives to encourage walking and bicycling to school. The program also strives to make walking and bicycling to school safer and facilitates the planning, development, and implementation of projects that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and improve air quality in the vicinity of schools. In addition to encouraging more children to walk or cycle to school, the program also seeks to address the safety needs of children already walking or cycling in less-than-ideal conditions.

Federal funding for the SRTS Program is allocated to every Department of Transportation across the nation and are given the flexibility to develop individual application guidelines and distribute SRTS funding at the local level. Accordingly, FDOT created a statewide SRTS competitive grant application process. Since the inception of the SRTS program, approximately 157 Miami-Dade County schools have been awarded funding for infrastructure improvements, totaling approximately \$28.3 million.

In July 2023 FDOT suspended the SRTS program indicating no new or existing grant applications will be funded pending revamping of the program. However, FDOT District 6 has expressed an interest to coordinate with TPO and the Miami-Dade County Department of Transportation and Public Works to fund pending SRTS applications.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE

There is no fiscal impact to the TPO Program.

- WHEREAS, the Interlocal Agreement creating and establishing the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Miami Urbanized Area requires that the Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO), in its role as the MPO, provides a structure to evaluate the adequacy of the transportation planning and programming process; and
- WHEREAS, in 2005 Congress created the Federal-Aid Safe Routes to School Program through comprehensive transportation legislation, ultimately resulting in nearly \$1 billion in funding; and
- WHEREAS, in 2012 Congress adopted Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century (MAP-21) making Safe Routes to School (SRTS) activities eligible to compete for funding alongside other programs, including the Transportation Enhancements program and Recreational Trails program, as part of a new program called Transportation Alternatives; and
- WHEREAS, the SRTS program promotes walking and bicycling to school through infrastructure improvements, safety education, and incentives to encourage walking and bicycling to school; and
- WHEREAS, the program strives to make walking and bicycling to school safer and facilitates the planning, development, and implementation of projects that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and improve air quality in the vicinity of schools; and
- WHEREAS, in addition to encouraging more children to walk or cycle to school, the program also seeks to address the safety needs of children already walking or cycling in less-than-ideal conditions; and
- **WHEREAS**, accordingly to the Federal Highway Administration, nationally, 10%–14% of car trips during morning rush hour are for school travel; and
- WHEREAS, federal funding for the SRTS program is allocated to every Department of Transportation across the nation and are given the flexibility to develop individual application guidelines and distribute SRTS funding at the local level; and
- WHEREAS, accordingly the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) created a statewide SRTS competitive grant application process; and
- **WHEREAS**, since the inception of the SRTS program, approximately 157 Miami-Dade County schools have been awarded funding for infrastructure improvements, totaling approximately \$28.3 million; and
- **WHEREAS**, in July 2023 FDOT advised it will be suspending the SRTS program and indicated no new or existing grant applications will be funded pending revamping of the program;

Hearing no questions or comments, it was moved by Board Member Higgins that the foregoing proposed resolution be approved. This motion was seconded by Board Member Regalado, and upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

It was moved by Board Member Desulme that the above-listed appointments made be approved. This motion was seconded by Board Member Martell, and upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

Hearing no questions or comments, it was moved by Board Member Harris that the minutes of April 20, 2023, be approved. This motion was seconded by Board Member Bermudez and upon being put to a vote, the motion passed unanimously.



6. REPORTS

A. BOARD MEMBERS

1. Legislation regarding the Miami-Dade Expressway Authority (MDX) and the Greater Miami Expressway Agency (GMX)

Chairman Bovo provided a brief overview of the discussion held at the Executive Policy Committee (EPC) meeting regarding House Bill 1305. He advised the consensus of the Committee was to stand still until litigation has been finalized.

2. In reference to Board Member Regalado's inquiry regarding the Flagler Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Demonstration Project, Ms. Bouclé announced that FDOT in coordination with the TPO and DTPW has placed the Kendall Project Development and Environment (PD&E) study in abeyance until data becomes available for the agency to reassess.

Mr. Iglesias confirmed the statement made by Ms. Bouclé and reported the Flagler BRT Demonstration Project was scheduled for 90-120 days of construction in 2024, followed by a year of analysis. Mr. Iglesias announced once the data has been obtained from the analysis then a determination will be made on the Kendall PD&E study.

Board Member Regalado mentioned her upcoming legislation with the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) which deals with easements for the BRT. She stated she would like to bring that information to the Board once introduced to the BCC.

Ms. Bouclé stated she will work with the FDOT and the County to ensure any available easement right-of-ways will be considered in the future.

3. Board Member Regalado introduced Mr. David Dech, Executive Director, South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) /Tri-Rail.

Mr. Dech stated a great deal of work has been accomplished since he began. He reported 500 windows have been replaced, 450 tons of debris has been removed from the right of way, and they have been working with the homeless coalition to be good neighbors. Mr. Dech also noted that Tri-Rail encourage investment, transit oriented development and increased connectivity to the stations. He announced SFRTA was one of six recipients to be awarded \$73 million from the FTA to make a rolling stock purchase. Mr. Dech informed the Board that a substantial investment of \$180 million will be made to meet the minimum standards and he thanked the Board for their participation.

4. Board Member Harris informed the Board that he was unable to serve as a member on the Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory



Council (MPOAC). Chairman Bovo subsequently appointed Board Member Martell to the MPOAC.

5. Chairman Bovo recognized TPO staff member Wilson Fernandez on his 35 years of service to Miami-Dade County and the TPO.

Chairman Bovo encouraged the Board members to attend the Industry Forum Breakfast scheduled for Monday July 17, 2023, from 8am - 11:45 am and he noted the FDOT District Secretary Jared W. Perdue, P.E. will be one of the keynote speakers.

Miami-Dade TPO Connected Autonomous Vehicle (CAV) Strategic Plan

Connected and automated vehicles (CAV) are emerging technologies that can reshape the transportation system and urban landscape of Miami-Dade County. They will likely improve safety, increase network efficiency, and reduce congestion but also pose potential risks and challenges. The Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) and Miami-Dade County are planning for and investing in building a more multimodal transportation system. The TPO is addressing the incorporation of CAV technologies into its short-, mid-, and long-term planning processes by developing this CAV Strategic Plan. The study process involved partner agencies via a Study Advisory Group (SAG) and the public via a Vision Workshop. The SAG included staff from the Miami-Dade Department of Transportation and Public Works (DTPW), educational institutions, private sector industry members, and other local agencies. This study uses connected and autonomous



vehicles (CAV) as an all-encompassing term for technologies related to vehicle communication and automation. Other related technologies, such as vehicle electrification, e-commerce, delivery vehicles, and telework, are also emerging or are in the preliminary stages of development and may significantly impact the transportation system. CAV safety and mobility applications overcome the physical limitations and distraction errors of humans behind the wheel and have the potential to dramatically reduce the number of fatalities and serious injuries caused by accidents on our roads and highways.



I would like to thank the DTPW family and our mobility partners for their steadfast commitment to our community as our transportation services and infrastructure are more critical than ever. As the Director and CEO, I commit to creating a strong foundation that positions our department for success.

Earlier this year, we launched <u>SHIFT305</u>, a strategic roadmap for DTPW, which aims to propel Miami-Dade forward to a cleaner, greener, more efficient and connected future by delivering on the priorities and actions of Thrive305 – the Mayor's bottom-up, community-driven framework with a focus on the policies, initiatives, and strategies that center on an equitable recovery and thriving community for Miami-Dade residents, visitors and industry.

The first half of 2023 has flown by and I'm proud of the fact that we've continued making great progress to advance so many critical transit and public works programs that will greatly benefit our community and quality of life for many years to come.

As such, I'd like to share with you a copy of DTPW's <u>Midyear State of the System Snapshot</u> highlighting some of our progress. Ridership is rebounding as of June 2023. Miami-Dade Transit ridership reached 245,700 average weekday riders which is a 101% recovery on all four modes combined from June 2019 (Pre-Covid); Metrobus on-time-performance (OTP) improved from 66.7% to 70% between January and June 2023, and at the same time, STS improved OTP from 83.3% in January to 91.2% in June. Most importantly, there has been a 14% reduction in the number of fatal crashes from January 2023 to June 2023 when compared to the same period in 2022, which reflects our commitment to the implementation of our Vision Zero initiative. The report is also available at miamidade.gov/transportation.

Our performance metrics for Metrobus, Metrorail, Metromover, paratransit services and Vision Zero are encouraging and establish accountability. The data we are gathering is also helping to understand the progress we have made as a department and community. With strong elected leaders, partners and an engaged citizenry, we have the support to get closer each day to our lofty vision of being the world's best provider of transportation options.

In closing, I'd like to express my gratitude to you and thank Miami-Dade County Mayor Daniella Levine Cava, the Chairman and Board of County Commissioners, the Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO), the Citizens' Independent Transportation Trust (CITT), our state and federal partners, and community stakeholders for the support to reimagine mobility success; accelerate solutions; value a culture of care; fuel innovation; and secure our future.

My pledge to you as the Director and CEO of DTPW is that our family of almost 4,000 strong will continue investing in our people, operating with discipline, achieving excellence, and, most important, delivering results for our residents, visitors and businesses.







II. ACTION ITEMS

A. The Underline – Department of Transportation and Public Works (DTPW)

Department of Transportation and Public Works (DTPW) representative Irene Hegedus began the presentation by stating that safety is the number one concern for DTPW. Ms. Hegedus elaborated on the slides in the presentation with emphasis on the three phases of the 10-mile project, to include the paths with improved twentyfive intersections. She stated that this project is a multi-modal corridor, not a park. Phase 1 is called the Brickell Backyard, which consists of a River Room, Outdoor Gym, Promenade Motion and the Oolite Room all having unique amenities representing the named themes. Phase 2 is called the "Hammock Trail which is scheduled to be open in December 2023. The Hammock Trail consists of the Hammock Playground, Vizcaya Station Plaza and The Rain Gardens. Phase 3 from SW 19th Avenue to Dadeland South is expected to be completed in 2025/2026. Dear Mayor Bovo:

Federal law requires the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) to jointly review and certify the metropolitan transportation planning process for each Transportation Management Area (TMA) every four years. A Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) with an urbanized area of 200,000 or more in population is referred to, in federal legislation, as a TMA. We recently conducted a review of the Miami TMA.

As a part of the TMA certification review process, FHWA and FTA utilized a risk-based approach containing various factors to determine which topic areas required additional evaluation during the certification review. The certification review process is one of several methods used to assess the quality of a regional metropolitan transportation planning process, compliance with applicable statutes and regulations, as well as the degree of technical assistance needed to enhance the effectiveness of the planning process. This certification review was conducted to highlight best practices, identify opportunities for improvements, and ensure compliance with regulatory requirements.

The review of the Miami-Dade TPO's planning process included a site visit conducted by representatives from the FHWA and the FTA on April 13, 2023. During the site visit, time was spent with the MPO staff, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), and the transit agencies to discuss the status of the MPO's "3-C" planning process. Throughout the site visit, opportunities were afforded to local elected/appointed officials and the general public to provide their insights on the Miami-Dade TPO's planning process. In addition to assessing the MPO's progress in addressing the findings from the previous certification review, the MPO's current and/or future implementation of the metropolitan transportation planning requirements was also considered.

Enclosed for your consideration is the final *TMA Certification Review Report* for the Miami TMA, which includes documentation of the various components of the FHWA/FTA certification review of the Miami-Dade TPO. The report provides an overview of the TMA certification review process, summarizes the various discussions from the recent site visit, provides a series of review findings, and issues the FHWA/FTA certification action. In general, the review determined the existence of a "3-C" metropolitan transportation planning process that satisfies the provisions of 23 U.S.C. 134, 49 U.S.C. 5303/5305, and associated Federal requirements. The Federal Review Team identified five (5) noteworthy practices, no corrective actions, and offers three (3) recommendations to improve the current planning process of the Miami-Dade TPO.

Based on the overall findings, the FHWA and the FTA jointly certify that the transportation planning process of the Miami TMA, which is comprised by the Broward MPO, Miami-Dade TPO, and Palm Beach TPA substantially meets the federal planning requirements in 23 CFR 450 Subpart C. This certification will remain in effect until **August 2027**.

TMA Certification Review Report

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Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO)

Section I. Overview of the Certification Process

Under provisions of 23 CFR 450.336(b) and 49 CFR 613.100, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) must jointly certify the planning process of Transportation Management Areas (TMAs) "not less often than once every four years." This four-year cycle runs from the date of issuance of the previous joint certification report.

The primary purpose of a certification review is to formalize the continuing oversight and evaluation of the planning process. The FHWA and the FTA work cooperatively with the TMA planning staff on a regular basis. By reviewing and approving planning products, providing technical assistance, and promoting best practices, the formal assessment involved in a certification review provides an external view of the TMA's transportation planning process.

A certification review generally consists of four primary activities. These activities include: 1) a "desk audit" which is a review of the TMA's planning documents (e.g. Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); 2) a "site visit" with staff from the TMA's various transportation planning partners (e.g. the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), local/regional transit service provider, and other participating State/local agencies), including opportunities for local elected officials and the general public to provide comments on the TMA planning process; 3) a Certification Report, which the Federal Review Team prepares, to document the results of the review process; and, 4) a formal presentation of the review findings at a future Miami-Dade TPO Board Policy meeting.

Certification of the planning process is a prerequisite to the approval of Federal funding for transportation projects in metropolitan areas. The certification review also helps ensure that the major issues facing a metropolitan area are being addressed. The review process is individually tailored to focus on topics of significance in each metropolitan planning area. Since 2018, to initiate the TMA certification review process, the Federal Review Team has utilized a risk-based approach containing various factors to determine which topic areas required additional evaluation during the certification review. **Appendix A** summarizes the risk evaluation, and the report notes in the relevant sections which topic areas were not selected for review due to existing stewardship and oversight practices after considering the risk factors.

The review for the Miami-Dade TPO was held on April 13, 2023. During this site visit, the Federal Review Team met with the staff of the Miami-Dade TPO, FDOT, SFRTA, DTPW committee representatives, other partnering agencies, and the public. See **Appendix B** for a list of review team members and site visit participants, and **Appendix C** for the TMA Certification Meeting Agenda.

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The purpose of the public engagement process is to inform the public of the Federal transportation planning requirements and allow the public an opportunity to provide input on the transportation planning process to the Federal Review Team. A public meeting for this certification review was held on April 13, 2023. Public feedback and engagement on the MPO's planning process was also obtained through the Miami-Dade TPO's website, Facebook, and Weekly Newsletter Twitter For those that could not attend the public meeting or who did not want to speak or post publicly, contact information for the Federal Review Team was provided. Members of the public were given 30 days from the April 13, 2023, to mail, fax or email their comments and/or request a copy of the certification review report. No additional comments were received by FHWA and FTA during the 30-day comment period.

A copy of the public engagement notices can be found in **Appendix D**. Screenshots of public input, minutes from the public meeting, including a listing of commenters and a summary of the public comments is provided in **Appendix E**.

A summary of the 2019 corrective actions and recommendations and their status can be found in **Appendix F**.

Section II. Boundaries and Organization (23CFR 450.310, 312, 314)

A. Description of Planning Area


Observations: The Miami Urbanized Area encompasses portions of Palm Beach, Broward and Miami-Dade counties in the southeastern part of Florida. The planning area boundary includes all of Miami-Dade County's 34 municipalities (19 cities, 6 towns and 9 villages) all of which are within census defined urbanized areas. The Miami-Dade County encompasses more than 2,000 square miles of land, but only 430 square miles of urban development that is situated between two parks: Everglades National Park and Biscayne National Park.


Miami-Dade County is the most populous county in the state. In the 2020 census the population in Miami-Dade County was approximately 2.7 million, a population growth of 8.2% from the 2010 census. There are 3.5 million residents forecasted by 2045. The population is primarily minority in composition, with 96.1% Hispanic, 17.3% black and 13.6% non-Hispanic white. Foreign born persons make up 54% of the population.

The 2006 Inter-local Agreement between the Broward, Miami-Dade, and Palm Beach MPOs created the Southeast Florida Transportation Council (SEFTC), under Florida Statutes Chapter 339.175, to serve as a formal forum for policy coordination and communication to carry out mutually agreed-upon regional initiatives. The agreement maintains the autonomy of each MPO for decisions that create direct impacts within its geographic area.

B. Metropolitan Planning Organization Structure

Observations: This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding:</u> The MPO's boundaries and organization substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.310 and 312.

C. Agreements

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's agreements substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.314.

Section III. Transportation Performance Planning (23 CFR 450.306(a), 306(d), 314(h), 324(f), 326(c), 326(d))

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's transportation performance planning activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.306, 314, 324, and 326.

Section IV. Scope of the Planning Process (23 CFR 450.306)

A. Transportation Planning Factors

<u>Observations</u>: This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's planning process substantially satisfies the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.306(b).

B. Air Quality

<u>Finding</u>: The Miami-Dade TPO is currently designated as an attainment area for all National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS).

C. Bicycle and Pedestrian Planning Activities

<u>Current Document Title</u>: Miami-Dade TPO 2045 Bicycle / Pedestrian Master Plan <u>Date Adopted</u>: September 2019

Observations: The bicycle and pedestrian mode is considered throughout the MPO's transportation planning processes. The Miami Dade TPO includes representatives of users of the bicycle and pedestrian users in developing and updating the LRTP, includes bicycle and pedestrian facilities in the LRTP and related improvement projects in the TIP. The 2045 Bicycle / Pedestrian Master Plan lays out strategies to strengthen bicycle and pedestrian-friendly connections with existing and future transit facilities. This Plan lays out programs and strategies to enhance how people walk and ride bicycles, in many scenarios to get to and from places we live, work, and play.

The Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Plan is a comprehensive plan which advances rapid transit corridors and bus transit corridors. The TPO collaborates with local and regional agencies to implement actions and activities at the cross section of the Bike /Ped Master Plan and the SMART Plan, these include: the SMART Trails, the SMART Plan Economic Mobility & Accessibility Studies, and Transit Hub Studies.

The Miami-Dade TPO has an active Bicycle Pedestrian Action Committee (BPAC) that reports to the TPO Governing Board on bicycle and pedestrian-related issues. The BPAC reviews transportation plans and projects for non-motorized mobility and safety, provides a forum for issues affecting bicyclists and pedestrians, and assists the Miami-

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Dade TPO staff in the development of the comprehensive bicycle transport plan. The BPAC also reviews the LRTP and bicycle and pedestrian mobility projects in the TIP.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's bicycle and pedestrian planning activities substantially satisfies the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.306(b), 324(f), and 326.

Noteworthy Practice: The Federal Review Team recognizes one noteworthy practice regarding Bicycle and Pedestrian Activities. For more details about this noteworthy practice, please see Section XI.

D. Transit

<u>Observations:</u> Transit services are provided by Miami-Dade County and South Florida Regional Transit Authority (SFRTA). Table 1 illustrates the operators and the respective transit modes which they operate within the Miami-Dade MPO boundaries.

Each agency's coordination with the MPO assists with fostering an effective multimodal approach to the transportation planning process and programs. This includes a multimodal transportation priorities list, as well as complete streets, transit-oriented development, and mobility hub initiatives which seek to improve both transit operations, mobility, and access to transit.

Through the MPO agreements, cooperative development of the planning products, coordination activities, and implementation of transit projects, the County of Miami-Dade and SFRTA are full partners in the MPO's planning process.

<u>Finding:</u> The MPO's transit activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 49 CFR 613.100 as well as the transit supportive elements outlined in 23 CFR 450.

Recommendations: The Federal Review Team offers two recommendations regarding Transit. For more details about these recommendations, please see Section XI.

E. Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS)

Observations: This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's ITS activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.306, 322, and 23 CFR 940.

F. Freight Planning

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's freight planning activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.306, 316, 324, and 326.

G. Security Considerations in the Planning Process

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's security planning activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.306, 324(f), 324(h), and 326.

H. Safety Considerations in the Planning Process

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's safety planning activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.306, 324(h), and 326.

Section V. Unified Planning Work Program (23 CFR 450.308)

Current Document Title: Miami-Dade TPO's Unified Planning Work Program for

Transportation Planning Activities

Date Adopted: May 5, 2022

<u>Observations</u>: The Miami-Dade TPO's above noted UPWP covers transportation planning activities/products for two fiscal years and contains sufficient description of the costs and activities the MPO plans to undertake to complete their planning responsibilities.

Miami-Dade TPO, Broward MPO, and Palm Beach TPA worked in close partnership during the development of the regional tasks for the 2023-2024 UPWP. In addition to ensuring consistency in identical budget tables documenting transfer of funds and

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outcome initiatives, Miami-Dade TPO agreed to take a leadership role in developing the 2050 Regional Transportation Plan. After agreeing to ensuring utilization of identical Federal fund type (PL), a memorandum of understanding was executed between the three parties to finalize and document their coordination and transfers.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's UPWP substantially satisfies the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.308.

Section VI. Interested Parties (23 CFR 450.316)

A. Outreach and Public Participation

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's outreach and public participation activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.316.

Noteworthy Practice: The Federal Review Team recognizes one noteworthy practice regarding Outreach and Public Participation. For more details about this noteworthy practice, please see Section XI.

B. Tribal Coordination

Observations: The Miami-Dade TPO provides a reasonable opportunity to the Indian Tribes by involving Indian Tribal Government(s) that have tribal lands located within its jurisdiction to participate in transportation planning processes, including the development of the public participation plan, LRTP and the TIP.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's tribal coordination activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.316(c).

C. Title VI and Related Requirements

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's Title VI and related activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 49 CFR 21, 49 CFR 27, 23 CFR 200, 23 CFR 450.316 and 336(a).

Noteworthy Practice: The Federal Review Team recognizes one noteworthy practice regarding Title VI and Related Requirements. For more details about this noteworthy practice, please see Section XI.

Section VII. Linking Planning and NEPA (23 CFR 450.318, 320, 324(f)(10), 324(g))

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's linking planning and NEPA activities substantially satisfy the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.318, 320, 324(f)(10), and 324(g).

Section VIII. Congestion Management Process (CMP) (23 CFR 450.322)

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's congestion management process substantially satisfies the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.322.

<u>Observations</u>: Fiscal constraint is demonstrated using tables and narrative. For the adopted LRTP, the FDOT provides an estimate of federal and state revenue available over the life of the plan, as well as an estimate of administrative, operations and

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maintenance costs over the life of the plan for the MPO to use. The revenue estimates are included in the plan. The MPO has also developed estimates for local funds. The plan identifies funding revenue sources, project costs and project phases for projects from the effective date of the plan through the plan's horizon year. Year of Expenditure costs are used in the plan. The LRTP is fiscally constrained.

<u>Finding</u>: The financial plan/fiscal constraint of the MPO's LRTP substantially satisfies the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.324(f)(11).

Recommendation: The Federal Review Team offers one recommendation regarding LRTP Financial Plan/Fiscal Constraint. For more details about this recommendation, please see Section XI.

Section X. Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) (23 CFR 450.326, 328, 330, 332, 334)

<u>Observations:</u> This topic area was not selected for additional review based on the results of the risk assessment process.

<u>Finding</u>: The MPO's TIP substantially satisfies the federal requirements as outlined in 23 CFR 450.326,328, 330, 332, and 334.

Noteworthy Practice: The Federal Review Team recognizes one noteworthy practice regarding the TIP. For more details about this noteworthy practice, please see Section XI.

Section XI. Findings/Conclusions

The following items represent a compilation of the findings that are included in this 2023 certification review report. These findings, which are identified as noteworthy practices, corrective actions, and recommendations, are intended to not only ensure continuing regulatory compliance of the Miami-Dade TPO's transportation planning process with federal planning requirements, but to also foster high-quality planning practices and improve the transportation planning program in this TMA. Corrective actions reflect required actions for compliance with the Federal Planning Regulations and must be completed within the timeframes noted. Recommendations reflect national trends or potential risks and are intended to assist the Miami-Dade TPO in improving the planning process. Noteworthy practices highlight efforts that demonstrate innovative ideas or best practices for implementing the planning requirements.

A. Noteworthy Practices

1. **Bicycle and Pedestrian Planning Activities:** The SMART Street Transportation Enhancement Program (STEP) was created to facilitate interagency

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coordination, innovation, and accelerated implementation of pedestrian and bicycle improvements that increase connectivity and enhance safety. The proposed improvements immediately advance low-cost projects which support complete streets concepts and first/last mile connections in Miami-Dade County. Projects range from implementing high emphasis crosswalks to enhance safety at intersections, using green paint to identify conflict points and keyholes along bicycle lanes, to the installation of scramble pedestrian crosswalks. Also, the Miami-Dade TPO has developed an evaluation plan to monitor and measure project success.

- 2. **Outreach and Public Participation:** The Federal Review Team commends the Miami-Dade TPO for their innovative approaches to engagement with the general public and the transportation industry stakeholders.
 - In order to ensure participation in the planning process pre-pandemic, the Miami-Dade County Public Involvement Management Team (PIMT), comprised of all the transportation agencies within Miami-Dade County, collaborated on a regular basis to go out into the community hosting "SMART Transportation Fairs" and interacting with citizens. In lieu of in-person outreach events during the pandemic, the Miami-Dade TPO began hosting a fast-paced, virtual outreach events (VOE) with the PIMT in fall 2020 titled "Taste of Transportation: TPA Lunch Series." The Taste of Transportation (ToT) series were based on the 2045 LRTP's Transportation Planning Areas (TPA) and were led by Host Chance, the TPO Master Chef, and the Transportation Chefs from each transportation partner agency where project briefings were shared and citizens provided feedback and asked questions.
 - The Miami-Dade TPO has actively participated in sixteen (16) peer exchanges and regularly hosts transportation industry conferences, most recently, the 2022 SMART Trends Transportation Summit and the 2023 TPO Industry Forum. These engagements foster increased dialogue and information exchanges facilitating the continuous, cooperative and comprehensive planning process among federal, state, and local stakeholders.

These are examples of how Miami-Dade TPO and transportation agencies throughout Miami-Dade County innovatively works together to provide citizens and stakeholders the opportunity to be actively involved with the transportation planning process.

3. Title VI and Related Requirements: The Federal Review Team commends the Miami-Dade TPO for the development and utilization of the Equity Assessment Tool. This tool is a GIS based, user friendly way to display census information which allows the MPO to assess and improve the equity of transportation projects in Miami-Dade County.

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- 4. Congestion Management Process: The Miami-Dade Transportation TPO embarked on an effort to understand telecommuting trends and the possibility that telecommuting can be used as a sustained traffic mitigation strategy to "flatten the congestion curve". The study completed in coordination with FDOT and Florida International University, resulted in several strategies including a Telecommuting Pilot Program being implemented by the South Florida Commuter Services (SFCS) to increase the number of telecommuters in the Southeast Florida region especially in sectors with low telecommuting usage. Along with an outreach campaign, for all industry sectors, this effort highlights the possibility of using telecommuting as another strategy in the MPO's congestion management toolbox.
- 5. Transportation Improvement Program (TIP): The Federal Review Team commends the MPO's Application Survey for the development of their List of Priority Projects. This survey provides the Miami-Dade TPO with specific information about each project related to project need, location for geographic distribution of projects, agency priorities and planning consistency.

B. Corrective Actions

There were no corrective actions identified.

C. Recommendations

- Transit: As the MPO continues efforts with implementing the three C's with DTPW and SFRTA to establish transit performance measures in the LRTP through inclusion of the TAM and development of a CMP Strategy Toolbox, the Federal Review Team encourages the MPO to monitor and evaluate the established performance measures using anticipated products identified in Tasks I, II, and/or III of the UPWP.
- 2. Transit: The MPO and transit providers have continued to demonstrate a progressive effort associated with a coordinated interoperability of projects. Although progress has been made, the Federal Review Team recommends the MPO continue coordination to implement this initiative for seamless travel from system to system. While the MPO referenced the PTASP requirements of the transit providers, the Federal Review Team also recommends the MPO coordinate with the transit providers and incorporate the PTASP into the planning process.
- 3. LRTP Financial Plan/ Fiscal Constraint: The current LRTP does a good job of identifying the many different funding sources that are used, as well as those that are available for transportation projects in the Miami-Dade TPO planning area. The LRTP also includes illustrative lists of projects that are currently unfunded. Revenues used for the funded projects are generally reflected by the Table

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header for that type of project (e.g., SIS, DPW, etc.,) but this does not work well for all project types that could be funded with many of the different revenues available. The Federal Review Team recommends that the MPO consider, in their next LRTP update that is now underway, a clearer method of identifying the type of funding anticipated for each project, particularly for project categories such as Bicycle/Pedestrian, which could be funded using many of the revenue sources.

D. Training/Technical Assistance

At the conclusion of the site visit, the Federal Review Team asked the MPO staff if they had any training or technical assistance needs. The Miami-Dade TPO identified technical assistance and/or peer exchange requests for the following topical areas: cool pavement technologies; housing criteria/needs and how to integrate this into the LRTP documents; planning capacity building; and bicycle, pedestrian, and complete streets. FHWA and FTA will work with the MPO to provide resources in these areas.

E. Conclusion

Based on the overall findings of the certification review, the FHWA and FTA jointly certify that the transportation planning process of the Miami TMA which is comprised in part by the Miami-Dade TPO, substantially meets the federal planning requirements in 23 CFR 450 Subpart C. This certification will remain in effect until **August 2027**.

Appendix F. Status of Previous Certification Findings

The following is a summary of the previous corrective actions and recommendations made by the Federal Review Team to the Miami-Dade TPO. The MPO's last certification review report was published in 2019.

A. Corrective Actions

There were no corrective actions identified

B. Recommendations

 Transit Interoperability: The MPO and transit providers are commended for their efforts associated with a coordinated interoperability of projects. While it appears that significant progress has been made, the federal review team encourages all agencies involved, including the MPOs, continue to coordinate the implementation of this initiative.

Update: Since the last certification review, significant advancements have been made in Miami-Dade County for transit interoperability payment systems, including touchless, and direct from app options. Additionally, payment from the Miami-Dade Transit app interfaces with other service providers, including rideshare service providers.

2. **Title VI and Related Requirements:** FHWA identified outdated and incorrect language in some of the County documents ancillary to the contract. FHWA and FDOT met with Miami-Dade County to provide training and technical assistance to eliminate or update outdated language in the procurement material for FHWA funds. On August 29, 2019, FDOT approved Miami-Dade County's new RFP template that will be used for all transportation and public works contracts. The Federal Review Team recommends that the MPO request a quality control review of all MPO contracting documents from the Miami-Dade County Transportation and Public Works, Director of Civil Rights and Labor Relations prior to issuing RFPs.

Update: In 2021-2022, the TPO procured a new General Planning Consultant pool (GPCVIII) and all new title VI and related requirements were reviewed and approved. TPO staff worked closely with the County Internal Services Department and procurement teams to ensure all documentation was current and extensive quality control occurred.

Dear Ms. Thompson:

The Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) has completed the review of the Draft 2023 Transportation Management Area (TMA) Certification Report and provide the attached minor comments. Also, we are transmitting our responses to the following FHWA recommendations:

1. Transit: As the MPO continues efforts with implementing the three C's with DTPW and SFRTA to establish transit performance measures in the LRTP through inclusion of the TAM and development of a CMP Strategy Toolbox, the Federal Review Team encourages the MPO to monitor and evaluate the established performance measures using anticipated products identified in Tasks I, II, and/or III of the UPWP.

Response: Miami-Dade TPO is including Performance Measure Monitoring and Key Performance Indicators (KPI's) in the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan that address and will monitor the transit measures, including TAM. TPO will also include a CMP strategy toolbox in the 2050 LRTP.

2. Transit: The MPO and transit providers have continued to demonstrate a progressive effort associated with a coordinated interoperability of projects. Although progress has been made, the Federal Review Team recommends the MPO continue coordination to implement this initiative for seamless travel from system to system. While the MPO referenced the PTASP requirements of the transit providers, the Federal Review Team also recommends the MPO coordinate with the transit providers and incorporate the PTASP into the planning process.

Response: Miami-Dade TPO intends to continue forward progress on this goal and is including future-ready initiatives for interoperability and innovation in the 2050 LRTP. The PTASP is currently included in the TIP annually, and the TPO will coordinate closely with Miami-Dade DTPW for PTASP in the 2050 LRTP, DTPW TDP and associated plans.

3. LRTP Financial Plan/ Fiscal Constraint: The current LRTP does a good job of identifying the many different funding sources that are used, as well as those that are available for transportation projects in the Miami-Dade TPO planning area. The LRTP also includes illustrative lists of projects that are currently unfunded. Revenues used for the funded projects are generally reflected by the Table header for that type of project (e.g., SIS, DPW, etc.,) but this does not work well for all project types that could be funded with many of the different revenues available. The Federal Review Team recommends that the MPO consider, in their next LRTP update that is now underway, a clearer method of identifying the type of funding anticipated for each project, particularly for project categories such as Bicycle/Pedestrian, which could be funded using many of the revenue sources.

Response: Miami-Dade TPO will ensure the eligibility of alternatives available as funding sources are clearly listed in both the cost feasible plan and as options to advance projects in the unfunded and illustrative sections of the 2050 LRTP.

In addition, during this reporting period, the Miami-Dade TPO would like to highlight a Best Practice for conducting periodic Transportation Industry conferences, as well as sixteen (16) Peer Exchanges, to facilitate a continuous, cooperative, and comprehensive planning process. These efforts, including the 2022 SMART Trends Transportation Summit, and the 2023 TPO Industry Forum, provided information exchange and dialogue between federal, state, and local transportation partners, fostering increased interagency cooperation and support to pursue federal and state funding for Miami-Dade County priority projects. As a result, Miami-Dade TPO adopted its highest level of funding for the Fiscal Year 2024-2028 Transportation Improvement Program.

On behalf of the Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO), I am pleased to submit this letter providing our support of the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) application to the U.S. Department of Transportation Multimodal Project Discretionary Grant (MPDG) Opportunity (Fiscal Year 2024 Cycle) for the TPO priority project US 27/State Road 25/Okeechobee Road Improvements, at SR 826/Palmetto Expressway in Miami, Florida. FDOT is submitting this application to support funding for improvement of this interchange and adjacent surface street segment to address chronic traffic congestion that affects not only general traffic movements, but significant heavy truck traffic in the freight-oriented warehousing district surrounding the interchange.

Two segments of SR 826 adjacent to the US 27 interchange have been identified in the top ten freight bottlenecks in the state of Florida. This recurring congestion triggered FDOT's initiative to address these congestion points as well as the general congestion along US 27 west to the Florida Turnpike interchange by devising an improvement program for the 10-mile US 27 corridor in northwest Miami-Dade County experiencing chronic delays - the corridor improvement strategy is anchored by the US 27/SR 826 interchange proposed for this grant application. The subject project will have a significant positive impact on traffic operations in and near the interchange, providing traffic level of service D through the year 2045, a remarkable improvement. Because the interchange lies within the heart of Miami-Dade County's freight and logistics district, the proposed improvements will broadly benefit freight, commuter and general traffic for decades to come.

Both US 27 and SR 826 are designated on the National Highway System, the National Highway Freight Network, and the Florida Strategic Intermodal System. The two candidate US 27 projects are aligned with the current FDOT Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Plan and the FDOT Freight Mobility and Trade Plan, the adopted Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan under Priority 1 (2020-2025), the current FDOT State, District 6, and TPO 5-Year Transportation Work Programs. In addition, the interchange and other improvements on SR 826 and US 27 were identified as priority projects in the Southeast Florida Regional Freight Plan (2014 Update) and the Miami-Dade County Freight Plan Update (2018). Clearly, the proposed project will positively impact traffic operations and safety and benefit the efficiency and reliability of freight and overall traffic movements.

Project Description:

This project consists of new connections from SR 836 to the Florida's Turnpike (HEFT). The project introduces four (4) new ramps providing drivers with direct expressway access and improved connectivity. The new movements include two (2) ramps connecting the eastbound and westbound Dolphin Expressway Extension to the Dolphin Park and Ride Transit Terminal Facility, one (1) ramp connecting southbound Florida's Turnpike to the SR 836 westbound, and one (1) ramp connecting the eastbound SR836 Extension to northbound HEFT. In addition, the project includes preliminary work for a future connection between NW 118th place and the Dolphin Station Park and Ride Transit Facility.

Project Status:

Estimated work completed as of July 31, 2023 - 60.4% with 62% of allowable contract time elapsed.

Project Progress Summary: Halley Engineering Contractors, Inc (HEC) continues with drainage, bridge structures and embankment work for the on and off ramps from the HEFT to SR836, and the ramps from the Dolphin Park and Ride Transit Terminal to SR836. HEC continues with excavation of the drainage retention pond in the southwest quadrant of the project. Embankment operations as well as drainage installation continues for the ramp from eastbound SR836 to the Dolphin Park and Ride facility, as well as the partial backfill of the pond. HEC is working on the installation of MSE wall panels and end bents adjacent to the second bridge which connects the HEFT southbound ramp to westbound SR836. HEC continues preparation for the construction of the concrete bridge railing for the bridge over Telemundo Way. HEC continues with construction of the shoulder barrier wall, excavation, and grading of the roadway template as well as the installation of light pole bases and conduit for the ramp connecting eastbound SR836 to HEFT northbound general-purpose lanes. Contract completion is scheduled for April 2024.

GMX Project No: 83611 Project Name: SR 836 / I-95 Interchange Improvements

Project Description:

The project begins on SR 836 at NW 17th Avenue and continues through the Midtown Interchange (I-95/State Road 836/I-395) along I-395 to the MacArthur Causeway Bridge for approximately 3 miles in the east-west direction. I-395 is an Interstate Principal Arterial and a major east-west connector for the beaches and Port; SR 836 is a Principal Urban Arterial that is also a major east-west connection to the Midtown Interchange. The project limits also include I-95 from NW 8th Street to NW 29th Street. SR 9A/I-95 is an Urban Interstate Principal Arterial and major north-south connector to downtown Miami.

Project Status:

Estimated work completed as of July 31, 2023 – 68% with 84.51% of allowable contract time elapsed.

Project Progress Summary: This summary only describes activities related to the double deck bridge and areas along SR-836 within the GMX system. One Hundred Percent (100%) of the concrete pier caps have been casted. CJV is working on the construction of the drill shafts for the double decker piers located on the Miami River. Formwork and reinforcing steel are ongoing for the pier caps east of the Miami River. The widening work of existing bridges and roadways on the SR-836 eastbound and westbound directions continue between NW 12^{th} Street and I-95 and the southbound I-95 ramp.

Work continues on the east and west connector bridges from I-395 to SR-836. The CJV is currently constructing the temporary bypasses around the signature bridge foundations to connect I-395 and SR836 in order to mitigate the delays of the FDOT signature bridge. The anticipated operational date for the westbound bypass has been rescheduled for November 2023. The Eastbound bypass is scheduled to open in January 2024. Continued coordination with the State court system for work around the jury parking lot as pier columns are being placed around the area. Project coordination continues with the City of Miami for right-of-way acquisition, lane closures, and permits.

Public Information Officer continues to work with all stakeholders within the project limits. Extensive coordination continues for the relocation of the homeless and operations affecting stakeholders around the Health District. Anticipated completion is scheduled for October 2027.
